Why Study the Holocaust in Berlin?

Berlin was the origin of most decisions related to the subjugation and extermination of six million European Jews as well as the murder of millions of non-Jews between 1933 and 1945. Among the non-Jewish victim groups were the mentally ill, political opponents to the Nazi regime, homosexuals, Sinti and Roma, Slavic people, Soviet POWs, people of African descent, and Jehovah's Witnesses. In Berlin, notorious SS leaders and administrators wrote the policies that put into action such measures as the national book burnings (1933); the repressive Nuremberg Laws (1935); *Kristallnacht* – the November Pogrom known as “The Night of Broken Glass” (1938); the attack on Poland and the beginning of WW II (1939), as well as the careful planning of the genocidal policies carrying out the “Final Solution” (1942). Between 1933 and 1945, Berlin was the epicenter of power and decision-making for what today is known as the Holocaust.

Today, some physical remnants of the Third Reich are still visible and have since been established as memorial sites. For instance, just north of Berlin is the former Sachsenhausen concentration camp. The Sachsenhausen camp compound included the so-called T-Building that housed the administrative headquarters for more than 20 concentration camps in occupied Europe. Only a few miles further north lies the former Ravensbrück concentration camp for women and children. Between 1939 and 1945, more than 130,000 inmates were murdered there. Corrie ten Boom survived Ravensbrück, and her book, *The Hiding Place*, was made into a movie.

Moral courage and resistance against the Nazi regime could also be found in Berlin. The brush manufacturer Otto Weidt, for example, risked his life by hiding deaf and blind Jews—thus protecting them, as well as able-bodied Jews, from deportation. In 1943, non-Jewish women carried out successful protests against the deportation of their Jewish husbands. Liselotte Herrmann, a young mother, passed on information about the Nazis' secret rearmament program. And Claus von Stauffenberg plotted to assassinate Adolf Hitler: Stauffenberg and his co-conspirators were executed inside the courtyard of the Bendler Block in Berlin.

Students studying the Holocaust in Berlin will visit many of these former sites of Nazi terror as well as sites of moral bravery and quiet heroism. Numerous archives, document centers, and memorial sites about the Holocaust are located in Berlin.

Located in Berlin's city center, the *Topography of Terror Foundation* is built above the remnants of the former Gestapo and SS headquarters. This is where Heinrich Himmler and Reinhard Heydrich had their offices. Between 1933 and 1945, the entire machinery of espionage, torture, deportation, and liquidation originated here.

In the center of the city is the *Holocaust Memorial* by Peter Eisenman:

His amazing design of over two thousand and seven hundred grey stone slabs creates a sense of instability and disorientation.

The Jewish Museum is only a few blocks away: www.jmberlin.de

Designed by Daniel Libeskind – architect of the Ground Zero memorial site in New York City – this museum is one of the most visited sites in the city, and an important center of contemporary Jewish culture in Berlin.

Studying in Berlin

Today's Berlin is a young, vibrant, multi-ethnic, exciting city. Its citizens are open-minded, cosmopolitan, sophisticated, and friendly. Berliners are known for their dry humor and quick wit, and English is spoken almost universally. Coffee shops, restaurants, bars, cabarets, independent theaters, art galleries, and discos abound.

The cultural activities, film festivals, street fairs, and the music scene are truly multicultural and offer something for everyone. Numerous theaters offer performances all year long. Berlin's public transportation system is efficient and fast covering the entire city and large portions of its beautiful surroundings. Bike enthusiasts will find hundreds of miles of safe, designated bike lanes within the city, and along rivers, lakes, and through nearby forests. More than 120 world-class museums, galleries, and memorial sites can be found in Berlin.

Fascinating are visits to some of the former residences of people such as Albert Einstein, Marlene Dietrich, Paul Hindemith, Franz Kafka, Fritz Lang, Emil Nolde, George Grosz, Rosa Luxemburg, and Martin Niemöller. Noteworthy are also several cemeteries (both Jewish and non-Jewish) with memorials and grave sites of writers Anna Seghers, Heinrich Mann, Bertolt Brecht and his wife, the actress Helene Weigel; artists Max Liebermann and John Heartfield; composers Hanns Eisler and Paul Dessau; philosophers G. W. F. Hegel, J. G. Fichte, and Herbert Marcuse; publisher Samuel Fischer; and resistance fighter Herbert Baum.

Shabbat services (Orthodox, Conservative, Liberal and Reform) are offered at eight local synagogues. Sunday church services, Catholic and Protestant, are available – also in English. There are houses of worship for other denominations as well.

Touro College

Touro College Berlin is a Jewish-sponsored, private, non-profit institution of higher learning and professional education. Touro College is fully accredited and operates a multi-campus, international institution with more than 23,000 students enrolled in campuses in New York, California, Florida, Nevada, Israel, Russia, France, Italy and Germany. Touro College is named after the 18th century Jewish-American philanthropists, Judah and Isaac Touro. Touro is also the name of the oldest synagogue in the United States located in Newport, Rhode Island.

Touro College was founded in 1971 by philanthropist, social scientist, and pioneer in higher education, the late Dr. Bernard Lander. Prior to establishing Touro College, Dr. Lander served as a professor of sociology at City University of New York and as president of the Queens Jewish Center. He was also a co-founder of the Yeshiva Dov Revel Day School in Queens, and he served on the founders' committee for Bar-Ilan University in Israel.

Touro College Berlin opened its doors in 2003 with the intent of continuing the rich tradition of Jewish life and learning that had been cut off in Germany with the advent of the Nazi period. To this end, Touro College Berlin also inaugurated a Master's Program in Holocaust Studies and Jewish Studies. Touro College adds its voice to the needed effort to oppose racism, anti-Semitism, as well as hate against the "other," promoting the values of cooperation, acceptance, and respect. The campus of Touro College Berlin is located on a Bauhaus estate. This magnificent architectural landmark is located beside the Havel River, and is reachable by an easy 20-minute bus ride from the city center.

Who may enroll in the Summer Program on the Holocaust?

While our program may appeal most to undergraduate students pursuing degrees in European Studies, Jewish Studies, History, English, German, Sociology, Religious Studies, Women’s Studies, or Ethnic and Identity Studies, we encourage applications from undergraduate students regardless of major, who possess an interest in the Holocaust. Our Summer Program also appeals to those students who need to fulfill a Humanities or General Education requirement, and who wish to meet this requirement with summer studies in Berlin. There is no prerequisite, and students enrolling in either *Summer Session I* or *Summer Session II* do not need to have taken courses on the Holocaust nor German language courses in order to attend the program in Berlin. Students should have at least sophomore standing and be enrolled at any accredited college or university in the United States or in Great Britain.

Dates of Summer Program 2012

Summer Session I: May 31 – June 29 | *Summer Session II*: July 11 – August 10
Each summer session offers two undergraduate courses with a total of six credits. Students may enroll in either *Summer Session I* or *Summer Session II*. It is not possible to take both sessions nor to extend the six credits over the entire summer.

Structure of the Summer Program Instruction is in English and our courses are taught by qualified professors with many years of teaching experience in the United States and Great Britain. Classes are conducted at the Touro College Berlin campus and at the *Topography of Terror Foundation* in the center of Berlin. Classes meet five times a week, Monday through Friday, from 9:00 am through 12:00 noon. Afternoon sessions are scheduled three times a week generally from 2:00 pm through 4:00 pm. Students will have guided tours of memorial sites such as the 1936 Olympic stadium, the House of the Wannsee Conference, the Sachsenhausen concentration camp, the Jewish Museum, the German Resistance Memorial Center, the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe, as well as the Berlin Wall Museum at Checkpoint Charlie. In addition, students will attend presentations by renowned scholars; meet with members of the Berlin Jewish community, and with survivors of the Shoah.

Course Numbers Touro College Berlin uses the course numbers of its main campus in New York City. The courses offered during *Summer Session I* and *Summer Session II* are designated undergraduate courses. Students planning to attend our summer program on the Holocaust need to consult with their advisors at their home institution for course equivalencies.

Contact Hours and General Content of Courses Each Touro College Berlin undergraduate course meets or exceeds the US accrediting standard of fifteen meetings consisting of fifty-minute contact hours per credit. Contact hours do not include travel time within Berlin, meals, recreational activities, or receptions. Contact hours may include, however, course-specific tours, guest lectures, and meetings with Holocaust survivors.

HIS 262 – History of the Holocaust This course is designed to introduce students to historical texts and documents concerning the Holocaust – the Nazis’ attempt to exterminate European Jews and other “undesirable” victim groups. Studying the Holocaust forces us to confront the darker side of our human experience. This course raises critical questions about the motivations for human action and moral choices. While the readings for this course will emphasize specific events that took place in Europe during WW II, discussions are designed to bring out the wider implications of these events. Topics to be covered include the origins of anti-Judaism and anti-Semitism, the development of Nazi policy toward the Jews and other targeted groups after Hitler’s coming to power in 1933, the design and carrying out of the “Final Solution,” Jewish responses to Nazi persecution, responses by non-Jews as “bystanders” and as brave individuals hiding and rescuing those in danger. Gender issues will be discussed and the special plight of children. Holocaust denial is also a subject of discussion. In addition, this course will consider the responses of other governments to Nazi policy – especially the role of the United States.

Note: Students interested in pursuing Honors studies should consult with their home college or university advisor prior to enrolling at Touro College Berlin.

LLE 500 – Literature of the Holocaust Autobiographies, memoirs, oral histories, fiction, and poetry about the Holocaust experience are uniquely suited to integrate insights from multiple perspectives. Texts written by survivors of the Holocaust offer general information as well as specific accounts of personal experiences. This course is broadly focused and interdisciplinary. Students don't need to be English majors or to have taken literature courses prior to enrolling. The course promotes critical reading skills and thinking. Authors to be discussed include Elie Wiesel, Primo Levi, Ruth Kluger, Paul Celan, Hanna Senesh, Salomon Perel, Louis Begley, Mietek Pemper, Charlotte Delbo, and others.

Note: Students interested in pursuing Honors studies should consult with their home college or university advisor prior to enrolling at Touro College Berlin.

Syllabi and Reading Lists Upon registration and acceptance into either *Summer Session I* or *Summer Session II*, you will receive a detailed reading list. You will receive your course syllabus in Berlin.

Support and Academic Advisement Upon your arrival in Berlin, a representative from Touro College Berlin will welcome you either at Tegel airport, the new Berlin-Brandenburg airport or the city's main train station. We will help you with the transfer to your housing. You will receive a folder with maps and other pertinent information about Berlin, including a free monthly pass for the entire public transportation system of Berlin, which includes all subways, light rail, busses, and trams.

Professors Viktoria Hertling and Andreas Nachama serve as the academic directors and instructors for *Summer Session I* and *Summer Session II*.

Dr. Hertling received her Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. For over 30 years she taught undergraduate and graduate courses at Mount Holyoke College, Kent State University, and the University of Nevada, Reno. She founded and from 1994 through 2008 directed the academic program in *Holocaust, Genocide & Peace Studies* in Nevada. She now teaches at Touro College Berlin. She is the author, editor, and translator of several books and numerous articles on the Holocaust, German-Jewish history and culture, and on European Exile Studies.

Dr. Nachama received his Ph.D. from the Free University in Berlin. He taught at the Ruhr University in Bochum. In Berlin he planned and coordinated important city-wide cultural events and for several years was the artistic director of the *Jewish Cultural Festival* in Berlin. Since 1994 Dr. Nachama has been the executive director of the *Topography of Terror Foundation*. In 2005 he was named Professor and Dean of the Master's Program in Holocaust Studies and Jewish Studies at Touro College Berlin. He has published widely on Jewish history and is the author and co-author of numerous articles and books.

Summer Session II: July 11 – August 10, 2012

- July 11 **10:00 am. General Orientation, bus and walking tour of central Berlin:** you will walk through the famous Brandenburg Gate, see the old Reichstag Building and the new Government Buildings, visit the Berlin Cathedral and the Grand Synagogue, pass by Berlin’s Red Town Hall and *Gendarmenmarkt*; stop at the Museum Island; stroll over the famous boulevard *Unter den Linden* and visit Humboldt University as well as many other places of historical and cultural importance.

- July 18 **End of drop period** and return of 50% of full program fee.
- July 26 **Midterm Exams.**

Tuition and Program Fees

The cost for *Summer Session I* or *Summer Session II* at Touro College Berlin is € 2,600. This includes tuition and all course-related expenses, including: a city tour of Berlin; entry fees for museums and tickets for memorial sites; a bus, subway and tram pass for Berlin; additional lectures and presentations.

Housing Touro College Berlin does not provide student housing. Instead, we will provide students with several options for housing, ranging from modest to moderate in price. Single rooms with breakfast start at € 40 per night. Small apartments are less expensive than hotels. There are also hostels with shared rooms. For further information about our housing options, please check with Ms. Ana de Santiago office.santiago@touroberlin.de, our Touro College Berlin secretary. She will be glad to send you further information. Once you are accepted for either *Summer Session I* or *Summer Session II*, please make your housing reservation ASAP. A list of hotels and apartments on page 19 is for your convenience.

Meals In addition to preparing one's own food, Berlin has many excellent restaurants in every price range. Also, there are literally hundreds of inexpensive coffee shops, bakeries, and health food stores selling juices, soft drinks, and sandwiches made to order.

On average, students might need no more than € 24 per day for food. This would come to approximately € 720 for the duration of one summer session. We recommend that you bring some extra spending money and your own laptop. The cost of textbooks will vary according to the course, but should be comparable to most university course book expenses in the United States.

Registration Deadlines

Summer Session I Your registration for Summer Session I must be received by **March 23, 2012**. A payment of € 450 is required with your application – € 350 deposit, plus € 100 non-refundable application fee. Students will receive a confirmation of their acceptance within ten (10) business days upon receipt of their registration deposit and application fee. Full payment is due seven (7) business days prior to the beginning of *Summer Session I*. Payments are only accepted by bank transfer.

Summer Session II Your registration for *Summer Session II* must be received by **April 27, 2012**. A payment of € 450 is required with your application – € 350 deposit, plus € 100 non-refundable application fee). Students will receive a confirmation of their acceptance within ten business days upon receipt of their registration deposit and application fee. Full payment is due seven business days prior to the beginning of Summer Session II. Payments are only accepted by bank transfer.

Cancellation Touro College Berlin reserves the right to cancel either summer session due to unforeseeable reasons beyond their control. In the unlikely case of this event, students would be refunded full deposits and application fees.

Academic Policies and Procedures The academic procedures below apply to the Touro College Berlin Summer Program and are bound by the academic policies of a student's home university. Any student currently enrolled in an American or foreign university who has an overall GPA of 2.5 or better on a 4.0 scale or equivalent is eligible to apply.

Grading Touro College Berlin grades will be reported to students and their home institution in the following way:

A Excellent Performance **B** Good **C** Average **D** Poor **F** Failure

If permissible by the home institution, range between the letters will be represented by plus or minus signs: A-, B+, B-, C+, C-, D+, D-.

With the permission of the home university, students may register for satisfactory/unsatisfactory grading for courses on an S/U basis. The same applies for the pass/fail (P/F) option. Enrollment on an S/U or P/F basis must be done in writing before the end of the drop period. Every college or university has its own policy regarding the number of S/U or P/F credits which can be taken each term and whether courses taken on an S/U or P/F basis can be counted toward a major, minor, general education, special certificates, etc. It is the student's responsibility to consult with the academic advisor at the student's home institution to determine the appropriateness of S/U or P/F courses. Touro College Berlin will report a letter grade to the home institution and the home institution will record a grade of S/U or P/F on the student's official transcript.

Class Attendance Touro College Berlin students are encouraged to take advantage of the expertise of their instructors. Therefore, regular class attendance is mandatory.

Examinations Normally, in addition to some quizzes and writing assignments, each Touro College Berlin course requires a midterm exam and a written final examination. Students will be given the results of quizzes, writing assignments, and the midterm exam in a timely fashion. Final examinations are kept on file for one year.

Auditing courses Students are permitted to audit Touro College Berlin's *Summer Session I* or *Summer Session II* with the permission of the home institution and the instructor if requested in writing prior to the end of the drop period. While in such cases no credit is earned or grade received, students auditing Touro College Berlin courses are still expected to follow the general attendance policy and must complete all assignments but are exempt from

examinations. Students who audit a course and do not attend class or complete class assignments will, at the recommendation of the dean, receive a grade of “W” (Withdrawn) on the Touro College Berlin grade report.

Incompletes (I) Requests for incomplete grades are granted only in exceptional circumstances. The dean of Touro College Berlin will allow an “I” grade only for reasons beyond the student’s control. In cases where an incomplete is unavoidable, the student and the instructor must sign a contract for the “I” grade that stipulates how much work has already been completed (including the percentage of work completed and grade level attained at the time the contract is signed), how much work outstanding is required for completion, and a deadline date, not to exceed six months from the signing of the contract, by which the work must be completed and grade level attained. The contract must be signed before the end of the period in which the student is enrolled, and it must be attached to the final grade report for the appropriate summer session. The “I” grade cannot be entered without this signed contract. If the incomplete grade is not cleared by the deadline shown on the contract and if the dean has not extended the deadline, the incomplete grade converts to a failing (F) grade.

Grade Appeals Students who wish to appeal a grade must petition Touro College Berlin in writing within 20 working days after the end of instruction. The office will forward the appeal to the dean of Touro College Berlin who will discuss the appeal with the course instructor. Normally within 45 working days after receipts of a grade appeal, students will receive a written response from either the course instructor or the dean of Touro College Berlin. A copy of the response will be filed with Touro College Berlin and will be forwarded to the home campus representative. While course instructors are the primary authorities in matters of grading, the dean of the Touro College Berlin has certain discretionary powers. His authority to change grades should be exercised only in the most unusual circumstances.

Transcripts A report of a student’s grades will be mailed to the student’s home address and the home institution upon completion of the summer program. Additional transcripts will also be available from Touro College Berlin. Instructions for ordering additional transcripts are included in the packet of materials students receive upon acceptance into a program. The transcripts of students with outstanding financial obligations to Touro College Berlin will be withheld.

Academic Reasons for Dismissal Students may be dismissed for reasons involving academic dishonesty. A Touro College Berlin faculty member who suspects a student of academic dishonesty will notify the student of the charge and proposed sanction in writing no later than five calendar days after the alleged action. Notification will be hand delivered or sent by certified mail. A copy of the notification to the student will also be sent to the dean of Touro College Berlin. The student has five (5) calendar days to appeal after receipt of the notification.

If the student admits guilt, or fails to appeal, the faculty member and the dean may impose an appropriate disciplinary action. The student may accept or appeal the sanction.

If the student denies the charge, the student must state this, in writing, to the dean of Touro College Berlin within ten (10) calendar days following notification. Within the next five (5) calendar days, the dean will then call a hearing between the student and the faculty member who charged the student. The student will have ten (10) calendar days to prepare for the hearing. If the hearing bears out the charge of academic dishonesty, the dean may implement disciplinary sanctions. At this juncture, the student has no further appeal rights. If the hearing finds the student not guilty of the charge of academic dishonesty, the matter is closed.

Health Care Information Touro College Berlin advises all students coming to Berlin to carry valid health insurance. Should their health care policy through their home institution or their parents not be sufficient or valid for medical care in Europe, we advise that students purchase an additional health care policy for the duration of their stay in Europe through their travel agent.

Visa and passport US Students traveling to Europe for less than three months to attend the Touro College Berlin Summer Program do not need a visa. However, a valid passport is required to enter the European Union. Students should consult their home institution or their travel agents on obtaining adequate travel documents.
